**Worth, Jennifer** Call the Midwife, Book 1; Shadows of the workhouse, Book 2; Farwell to the East End, Book 3

### **Russell, Jan Jarboe** The Train to Crystal City

From 1942 to 1948, trains delivered thousands of Japanese, German, Italian immigrants and their American-born children to a family internment camp in Texas. Crystal City was the center of a government program called "quiet passage," under which hundreds were exchanged for more important Americans held behind enemy lines.
